It is Luke, in his second volume, the Acts of the Apostles, who has located the imparting of the Spirit on the Church on the Jewish feast of Pentecost. The account of this in today's First Reading (Acts 2:1-11) concludes with a list of people from many regions who hear the testimony of the apostles each in their own language. The nationalities refer, in first instance, to pilgrims from the Jewish Diaspora. They also foreshadow the universal mission of the Church, which is now being empowered and equipped for its mission to be a "light for the revelation of the nations" (Luke 2:32; cf. Isa 42:6).

ESSENTIAL MESSAGE This mission will work towards overcoming the dispersal and disunity of humankind symbolised by the plurality of languages introduced after the episode of the Tower of Babel (Gen 11:1-9). The Church will speak in many languages but communicate through each the same essential message concerning the outreach of God's compassionate love ("the marvels of God") to the world.

Some details in the account are rather elusive, including a play upon the several senses of the word "tongue". As in English, the Greek word glossa refers both to the physical organ of speech and the various languages which it produces. Along with this reference to language, the text also makes a metaphor out of the primary physical meaning in the sense of "tongues of flame".

In the biblical (OT) tradition the sound of a mighty wind and manifestations of fire could signal God's presence and power, notably when Israel stood before God at the foot of Mount Sinai. What is described here seems to be a central fiery mass from which distinct "tongues" separate off and come to rest on individuals. The overall sense would be that the empowering Spirit, which rested solely upon Jesus during his own life, has now, in accordance with his promise (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:8a), been distributed among those who are to carry on his mission – bringing the Word to Israel in first instance, then to Judea and Samaria, and ultimately "to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8b).

DISCERNMENT OF SPIRITS In the **Second Reading**, Gal 5:16-25, Paul offers a very early instruction on "discernment of spirits," that is, on the way the presence of the Holy Spirit can be detected in the pattern of people's lives. Earlier in the letter Paul had warned his Galatian converts that they are not to take on the yoke of the Jewish law. Does this mean freedom from all moral restraint? Not at all, says Paul. The Spirit, transforming the heart with a sense of God's unselfish love, has taken over the Law's role of indicating how we should live. Beyond this, the Spirit has given what the Law could not achieve: the will and capacity to do so.

Over against this enlivening force of the Spirit stands what Paul calls "the flesh" (so, literally, the NRSV). "Flesh" is one of the most difficult Pauline terms to render in modern English (Jerusalem Bible: "self-indulgence"). For Paul, the distinction between "flesh" and "spirit" does not correspond to that between "body" and "soul" – as though all behavioural problems were due to the bodily aspect of human beings. "Non-physical" vices such as back-biting and quarrelling are just as much "sins of the flesh" for Paul as, e.g., sexual misconduct or gluttony.

Paul takes the distinction from his biblical anthropology where both terms refer to the whole human person seen from two opposite points of view. As "flesh" the person is particularly in the grip of all-controlling, self-centred desire (cf. the Buddhist idea of "desire"). As "spirit" a person is open to being caught up and transformed by the supremely unselfish love of Christ, communicated to believers through the Spirit. Hence the conflict between the two "forces" that tug at us – and the diverse outcomes Paul lists at length.

SPIRIT AS 'PARACLETE' In the **Gospel**, John 15:26-27; 16:12-15, Jesus speaks of the Spirit as "Paraclete" – again, not an easy term to translate. A "paraclete" was a person of upright character, highly respected in the community, whom you took to court to vouch for you and advise you when you were on trial – a cross between a character witness and a good lawyer. Though Jesus, after his post-resurrection return to the Father, will no longer be physically present to the disciples, the Spirit will perform a "paraclete" role for them: strengthening, comforting, advising. In particular, he will lead the community to "the complete truth" in the sense of deepening the process of revelation begun in Jesus. The teaching office of the Church, guided by the Spirit, has its foundation here.

Acts 2:1-11

When Pentecost day came round, they had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech. Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites: people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome - Jews and proselytes alike - Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

RESPONSORIAL PSALM Psalm 103(104):1, 24, 29-31, 34 Lord, send out your Spirit and renew the face of the earth.

Bless the Lord, my soul! Lord God, how great you are. How many are your works, O Lord! The earth is full of your riches. $\ensuremath{\textbf{R}}$

You take back your spirit, they die, returning to the dust from which they came. You send forth your spirit, they are created; and you renew the face of the earth. **R**

May the glory of the Lord last forever! May the Lord rejoice in his works! May my thoughts be pleasing to him. I find my joy in the Lord. **R**

SECOND READING

Galatians 5:16-25

If you are guided by the Spirit you will be in no danger of yielding to self-indulgence, since self-indulgence is the opposite of the Spirit, the Spirit is totally against such a thing, and it is precisely because the two are so opposed that you do not always carry out your good intentions. If you are led by the Spirit, no law can touch you. When selfindulgence is at work the results are obvious: fornication, gross indecency and sexual irresponsibility; idolatry and sorcery; feuds and wrangling, jealousy, bad temper and quarrels; disagreements, factions, envy; drunkenness, orgies and similar things. I warn you now, as I warned you before: those who behave like this will not inherit the

kingdom of God. What the Spirit brings is very different: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, trustfulness, gentleness and self-control. There can be no law against things like that, of course. You cannot belong to Christ Jesus unless you crucify all self-indulgent passions and desire. Since the Spirit is our life, let us be directed by the Spirit.





Pentecost

FEAST DAYS

Pentecost always occurs 50 days after the resurrection of Jesus and 10 days after his ascension into heaven. [...]

The timing of these feasts is also where Catholics get the concept of the novena - nine days of prayer - because in Acts 1, Mary and the Apostles prayed together "continuously" for nine days after the Ascension leading up to Pentecost. Traditionally, the Church prays the novena to the Holy Spirit in the days before Pentecost. [...]

In the Christian tradition, Pentecost is the celebration of the person of the Holy Spirit coming upon the Apostles, Mary, and the first followers of Jesus, who were gathered together in the Upper Room.

A "strong, driving" wind filled the room where they were gathered, and tongues of fire came to rest on their heads, allowing them to speak in different languages so that they could understand each other. It was such a strange phenomenon that some people thought the Christians were just drunk - but Peter pointed out that it was only the morning, and said the phenomenon was caused by the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit also gave the apostles the other gifts and fruits necessary to fulfill the great commission - to go out and preach the Gospel to all nations. It fulfills the New Testament promise from Christ (Luke 24:46-49) that the Apostles would be "clothed with power" before they would be sent out to spread the Gospel.

Why do we celebrate Mary, as Mother of the Church?

The theological roots of this title go back to the early Church. The Fathers of the Church, holy and studious bishops of the first centuries, often spoke of Mary as the New Eve. Just as the Woman Eve was "the mother of all the living" (Gen. 3:20), the Woman Mary was mother of all those living in Christ. In Revelation 12:17, St. John says that this Woman's offspring are "those who keep the commandments of God and bear testimony to Jesus."


