The theme linking the First Reading and the Gospel seems to hover between two aspects of salvation that might, at first sight, seem to stand in some tension. On the one hand, the First Reading (Isaiah 66:18-21) stems from one of the great universalist passages of Second Isaiah where the prophet foresees the outreach of salvation, beyond Israel, to the nations of the world. The nations that once took members of God's people into captivity, will bring them back to Jerusalem in honour. Moreover – and this is truly striking – some members of the nations will become priests and levites in the Temple. We Christians from the nations of the world, baptised in Christ, are all heirs of this striking promise.

VISION OF INCLUSIVENESS

The universalist note is picked up in the concluding sentences of the **Gospel** (Luke 13:22-30), where Jesus observes that "people from east and west, from north and south, will come to take their places at the feast in the Kingdom of God". But now the inclusive vision underwrites the prophetic warning that is the chief point of the entire passage. Those who might consider themselves "insiders" and so be complacent about their inclusion had better take note. Too late, they may wake up to find themselves excluded, while, to their anguish and chagrin, they see many included whom they would have considered outsiders.

The warning is sparked off by a question about the number who will be saved. Jesus will not respond to speculations in these terms. It is the present, not the future, that will decide the issue. So he turns the question back into a warning not to miss the opportunity while it is still available.

As always, the imagery he appeals to is taken from everyday life. When an entrance is narrow and many are trying to get through (think of people struggling to get into a department store when bargain sales are on), it pays to struggle and get to the front right away. Jesus is not necessarily commending such behaviour. He is simply pointing to common human experience and applying this everyday image to taking advantage of God's generous offer of salvation. In the person and preaching of Jesus this offer is now available but it will not always be there. People cannot just "coast" into salvation; an effort is required.

TRAVELLERS LOCKED OUT

The image then alters. It now seems to be that of travellers arriving late at a large household or inn. Though late, they hope for special consideration on the grounds of being known to the householder. But the lodging is full up with others (the people "from east and west, ...") who have got in before them; all is barred and locked up for the night. No use then standing outside knocking, claiming all kinds of familiarity with the householder. With his lodging satisfactorily full, he doesn't want to know them. Once again, the image plays powerfully on the feelings of his audience: imagine how you'd feel in that situation – out on the street for the night in a strange city, the door slammed brutally in your face. How you'd envy those ("from east and west, ...") who'd got in before you.

The hospitality of God is ample and generous. In the preaching of Jesus – continued down to our day in the preaching of the Church – we are all invited to the banquet. But the invitation will not be available forever. Human beings can exclude themselves from the banquet by not being prepared to accept the divine hospitality at the time, and in the company, of God's choosing.

GOD'S WAYS ARE NOT OUR WAYS

Here, once again, we encounter the sense, so strong in Luke's Gospel, that conversion of heart is not something people can afford to put off indefinitely. God's ways are not our ways. Daily the Gospel challenges the narrowness of our thoughts and the limits of our generosity. To allow this to happen is, in effect, to go in by "the narrow gate", the gate that strips us of the "baggage" our selfishness makes us acquire. For those prepared to live in this way, the question of salvation barely arises. It can be safely left in the hands of the all-generous God whose only desire in our regard is to call us to the banquet of life.

The **Second Reading**, from Hebrews 12:5-7, 11-13, speaks of suffering in terms of an image fairly common in the Wisdom literature of the Bible: that of the "disciplinary" punishment a father might give his son. Such a view of parent behaviour is unlikely to be appealing today. (It is a view that is challenged, incidentally, in the Book of Job.) In preaching from this reading it might be best to concentrate on the image of the discipline required in athletic training, which also seems to be present.

As an offering to the Lord they will bring all your brothers, on horses, in chariots, in litters, on mules, on dromedaries, from all the nations to my holy mountain in Jerusalem, says the Lord, like Israelites bringing oblations in clean vessels to the Temple of the Lord. And of some of them I will make priests and Levites, says the Lord.

SECOND READING

Hebrews 12:5-7.11-13

Have you forgotten that encouraging text in which you are addressed as sons? My son, when the Lord corrects you, do not treat it lightly; but do not get discouraged when he reprimands you. For the Lord trains the ones that he loves and he punishes all those that he acknowledges as his sons. Suffering is part of your training; God is treating you as his sons. Has there ever been any son whose father did not train him? Of course, any punishment is most painful at the time, and far from pleasant; but later, in those on whom it has been used, it bears fruit in peace and goodness. So hold up your limp arms and steady your trembling knees and smooth out the path you tread; then the injured limb will not be wrenched, it will grow strong again.

Alleluia, alleluia! I am the way, the truth, and the life, says the Lord; no one comes to the Father, except through me. Alleluia!

GOSPEL Luke 13:22-3

Through towns and villages he went teaching, making his way to Jerusalem. Someone said to him, 'Sir, will there be only a few saved?' 'Once the master of the house has got up and locked the door, you may find yourself knocking on the door, saying, "Lord, open to us" but he will answer, "I do not know where you come from." 


