Baptism are usually scheduled Sunday 12:30pm; Baptismal instructions to be arranged with parents before baptism. Weddings require six (6) months notice. This origins of this feast in honour of the cross of Jesus go back to the discovery of the true cross and the dedication of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem on 14 September, 326. Up till that time, Christians had been reticent in venerating something still in use as a terrible means of execution. But when the Roman emperor Constantine became a Christian, he abolished crucifixion and adopted the cross as a symbol of victory, clearing the way for Christians to publicly venerate and proclaim the cross.

In this sense the cross was 'exalted' in Christian consciousness from something shameful and repugnant to a triumphant symbol of God's victory over death and sin, and the gift of divine life – something well expressed in the Preface for today.

PASSION THEOLOGY

In a sense all this had already been anticipated in the Passion theology of the Fourth Gospel, where in contrast to the Synoptic presentation – especially that of Mark and Matthew – the lifting up of Jesus upon the cross is already seen as his 'glorification' and the beginning of his return to the Father and exaltation at God's right hand. It is appropriate, then, that the Gospel and First Reading for today are taken from the Gospel of John, 3:13-17, and a passage from the Old Testament, Num 21:4-9, to which it alludes.

The **First Reading** recounts a curious incident of Israel's desert wandering where the people have been punished with a plague of deadly serpents for complaining and grumbling against God and Moses. At the intercession of Moses, God, who had inflicted the punishment, also provides a remedy. Moses is told to construct a bronze image of the fiery serpents whose bites are proving fatal. When the Israelites look upon the image of what is afflicting them, it acts as an antidote to the bite, and they live. They find a remedy by confronting in this way the very instrument of punishment and the evil that brought it upon them.

The Gospel comes from the final part of Jesus' dialogue with the Pharisee Nicodemus. Jesus alludes to the incident of the bronze serpent erected by Moses as a comment, on the one hand, upon his superiority to Moses and as a foreshadowing or 'type' of his own coming 'exaltation' in death, on the other. He challenges a Jewish tradition that Moses actually 'went up to heaven' when he ascended Mount Sinai to receive the Law.

No human being, including the great figure of Moses, has ever gone up to heaven in this sense. But, to rescue the world from sin and death, One whose true 'home' is in heaven 'with God' (1:1) has 'come down from heaven', become 'flesh' (human) and 'pitched his tent among us' (1:14). As the true goal of this coming among us this same Son of God will be 'lifted up' in order to give life to the world.

LIFTING UP

The 'lifting up' will occur upon the cross, the instrument of Christ's return to the Father and ascent to heaven. Those who approach the cross in faith, who 'look upon it' in this sense, as the Israelites looked upon the figure of the bronze serpent, will receive what the Israelites received: rescue from death and the gift of life. As it was challenging for the Israelites to confront the serpent, the instrument of their affliction, so it is challenging for believers to confront the cross, which is at one level the instrument of a terrible execution. But those who 'look upon it' with faith confront at one and the same time their own sinfulness and the victory over that sinfulness that the cross represents. Beyond the terrible execution, Christ dying upon the cross becomes transparent to the extremity of divine love that has brought him there to give rescue and life to human beings.

DIVINE OUTREACH

In commentary upon this, the Gospel ends with two of the most celebrated sentences in the entire New Testament – ones that assert with utter clarity the divine outreach in love to the world represented by the whole mission, life and death of the Son of God. In contrast to summoning a human mediator (Moses) up to a meeting upon a mountain, God has in the person of the Son made a costly full 'descent' into the human condition, in order to abolish sin and death and raise human beings to share the life of God. This, not condemnation or punishment is the sole intent of God in our regard.

In the equally rich **Second Reading**, Phil 2:6-11, Paul quotes a very early Christian hymn expressing the same sense of costly divine entrance into the human condition. The hymn ends with the whole universe acknowledging Christ's eventual triumph, something anticipated in the liturgy of the Church.

Readings

ENTRANCE ANTIPHON

We should glory in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, in whom is our salvation, life and resurrection, through whom we are saved and delivered.

FIRST READING

Numbers 21:4-9

On the way through the wilderness, the Israelites lost patience. They spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt to die in this wilderness? For there is neither bread nor water here; we are sick of this unsatisfying food.'

At this God sent fiery serpents among the people; their bite brought death to many in Israel. The people came and said to Moses, 'We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you. Intercede for us with the Lord to save us from these serpents.' Moses interceded for the people, and the Lord answered him, 'Make a fiery serpent and put it on a standard. If anyone is bitten and looks at it, he shall live.' So Moses fashioned a bronze serpent which he put on a standard, and if anyone was bitten by a serpent, he looked at the bronze serpent and lived.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Do not forget the works of the Lord!

Give heed, my people, to my teaching; turn your ear to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth in a parable and reveal hidden lessons of the past. R

When he slew them then they would seek him, return and seek him in earnest. They would remember that God was their rock, God the Most High their redeemer. **R**

But the words they spoke were mere flattery; they lied to him with their lips. For their hearts were not truly with him; they were not faithful to his covenant. R

Yet he who is full of compassion forgave their sin and spared them. So often he held back his anger when he might have stirred up his rage. R


SECOND READING

Philippians 2:6-11

The state of Jesus was divine, yet he did not cling to his equality with God but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave, and became as men are; and being as all men are, he was humbler yet, even to accepting death, death on a cross. But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names so that all beings in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld, should bend the knee at the name of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

GOSPEL John 3:13-17

Jesus said to Nicodemus: 'No one has gone up to heaven except the one who came down from heaven, the Son of Man who is in heaven; and the Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved."


