Readings

Sat 1 Nov (including 6PM Mass) Rev 7:2-4,9-14; Ps 23:1-6; 1 Jn 3:1-3; Mt 5:1-12 **Sun 2 Nov** Ws 3:1-9, Pss 114:5-6, 115:10-11, 15-16, RPs 114:9; Rom 8:31-35, 37-39; Jn 14:1-6

The Lectionary offers a wide variety of readings for the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed, which replaces a Sunday of Ordinary Time that falls on 2 November. Here I comment on those offered first in the Lectionary, which actually provide an attractive set. As in the Scriptures generally, they say little about what happens to people after they die but much about the faithfulness of God, the supreme guarantee for believers of the gift of eternal life.

The **First Reading**, from Isa 25:6-9, is a magnificent passage to begin the commemoration. The prophet promises that 'on this mountain' – that is, on the mountain of Sion in Jerusalem – God will prepare a banquet for all nations, wiping away the tears and 'the shroud cast over all peoples'.

The 'shroud' is the threat of death – the prospect of our own death, and that of our loved ones. The prophecy makes clear that God's only intent in respect to human beings is to have them as guests at a rich 'banquet' of eternal life. Later, passages such as this gave rise to the image of the 'messianic banquet' as the key symbol of the Kingdom of God. The occasions on which Jesus miraculously fed the multitudes in the wilderness were a foretaste and pledge of the full divine 'hospitality' to come – as of course is also the Eucharist celebrated 'in his memory of him'.

HOPE OF SALVATION

In the **Second Reading**, Rom 5:5-11, St Paul asserts the hope of salvation that flows from God's faithful love. The first sentence speaks of the Spirit in terms of the standard biblical image of water gushing forth or, as here, 'poured out'. What has been 'poured out' in our hearts through the gift of the Spirit is an assurance of God's love. It is not our love for God that is in view – though that should follow – but a felt sense of God's love for us. In Paul's view this is what should engender hope for the future, despite our inability to see beyond the veil of death.

Paul then develops this 'proof' from God's love in a series of statements featuring a kind of a fortiori logic. If when we were sinners ('enemies'), God loved us so much as to give up his Son to a costly death to bring about reconciliation, how much more, now that we are reconciled and 'friends', will God not ensure that we are brought 'the full distance', so to speak, that is, to final salvation.

Having paid so great a cost (the death of the Son) God will hardly leave us 'half-way'. [Note that at the end of v 9, despite popular translations (Jerusalem Bible; NRSV), the Greek original simply refers to being saved 'from the wrath' – no mention 'of God' in this connection. The inclusion of this phrase in a context where God's love is central, has always seemed unjustified and unfortunate to me.] In the face of death, the passage flings a defiant act of hope based upon Paul's keen sense of God's faithfulness and love (see also Rom 8:31-39, where the same argument returns).

APPROPRIATE CHOICE

The episode in Luke's **Gospel** where Jesus raises of the son of the widow of Nain (7:11–17) is an appropriate choice for today's commemoration. This scene, unlike so many others in the Gospels, does not begin with someone asking Jesus for help. As he approaches the Galilean village of Nain with his disciples, he simply comes across the funeral procession and, moved with compassion, takes action. 'Moved with compassion' translates a Greek word (esplagchnisthe) indicative of strong emotion. The lame translation 'Jesus felt sorry for her' (the Jerusalem Bible reading in our Lectionary) is hardly adequate. Luke uses the same Greek expression to convey the response of the Good Samaritan for the wounded man that he sees by the side of the road (10:33); it is also the reaction of the father of the Prodigal Son when, from afar, he catches sight of the young man returning to the family home (15:20). In other words, we have to do here with a great wave of divine compassion welling up in the face of human tragedy – here the death of a young person, and the grief and future desperate situation of his mother. Without a husband and lacking other sons, who will provide for her in her later years?

Note the lovely touch at the end. Jesus doesn't just call the young man back to life: 'He gave him back to his mother' (v. 15). The mother's grief is as much the concern of Jesus as the restoration of the young man to life.

In this way the Gospel in a more general way addresses not just the problem of death itself but the grief occasioned by the passing of those we love.

FIRST READING

Wisdom 3:1-9

The souls of the virtuous are in the hands of God, no torment shall ever touch them. In the eyes of the unwise, they did appear to die, their going looked like a disaster, their leaving us, like annihilation; but they are in peace. If they experienced punishment as men see it, their hope was rich with immortality; slight was their affliction, great will their blessings be. God has put them to the test and proved them worthy to be with him; he has tested them like gold in a furnace, and accepted them as a holocaust. When the time comes for his visitation they will shine out; as sparks run through the stubble, so will they. They shall judge nations, rule over peoples, and the Lord will be their king for ever. They who trust in him will understand the truth, those who are faithful will live with him in love; for grace and mercy await those he has chosen.

SECOND READING

Romans 8:31-35, 37-39

With God on our side who can be against us? Since God did not spare his own Son, but gave him up to benefit us all, we may be certain, after such a gift, that he will not refuse anything he can give. Could anyone accuse those that God has chosen? When God acquits, could anyone condemn? Could Christ Jesus? No! He not only died for us - he rose from the dead, and there at God's right hand he stands and pleads for us. Nothing therefore can come between us and the love of Christ, even if we are troubled or worried, or being persecuted, or lacking food or clothes, or being threatened or even attacked. These are the trials through which we triumph, by the power of him who loved us. For I am certain of this: neither death nor life, no angel, no prince, nothing that exists, nothing still to come, not any power, or height or depth, nor any created thing, can ever come between us and the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus our Lord.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! This is the will of my Father, says the Lord, all who believe in the Son will have eternal life and I will raise them to life again on the last day. Alleluia!

GOSPEL John 14:1-6

Jesus said to his disciples: 'Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God still, and trust in me. There are many rooms in my Father's house; if there were not, I should have told you. I am going now to prepare a place for you, and after I have gone and prepared you a place, I shall return to take you with me; so that where I am you may be too. You know the way to the place where I am going. Thomas said, 'Lord, we do not know where you are going, so how can we know the way? Jesus said: I am the Way, the Truth and the Life. No one can come to the Father except through me.
